FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Community Members,

Durham Elementary School is a strong and diverse community dedicated to student learning. Rich with experience, the teachers and staff at Durham pour their hearts and minds into ensuring success for ALL students. This is clear in our mission:

The Durham community works together to educate and inspire each and every student and nurture the whole child within a safe environment.

Overall, the focused work of Durham's teachers and staff on student learning, combined with the long-standing support of education by parents and community members, produced another year of positive student growth and achievement.

As you read the Oregon Report Card for Durham Elementary School you'll notice that **68%** of our students met or exceeded state standards in English Language Arts and **57%** met or exceeded in math. While we are pleased by this progress, we are not satisfied. When you break down our data by subgroups you'll quickly notice that some segments of our student population did not make the growth or progress that we expect as measured by the Smarter Balanced Assessment, the primary tool by which Durham's progress is measured.

As you read through the report card and its various tables you can see how well each sub-group of our students (white, ELL, students with disabilities, TAG, etc.) performed. There are sub-groups clearly not performing at the level we want and expect. Improving the academic growth and performance these sub-groups will be one area of focus of our work in the coming year as we expect **ALL** Durham students to achieve at high levels. In order to reach this goal we will continue to focus improving our classroom instruction by incorporating new research based instructional strategies designed to improve student achievement especially for these underperforming sub-groups.

Our mission is clear, our vision clearly defined and our resolve to improve is unshakable. We care deeply about the growth and success of every student. To that end we will continue to work hard to improve our instruction and provide a positive school experience that meets the needs of each child in order to ensure that they are college and career ready upon graduation.

Please note that while changes in state accountability are being implemented, **Schools will not receive overall ratings on this report card**, as they have in the past.


